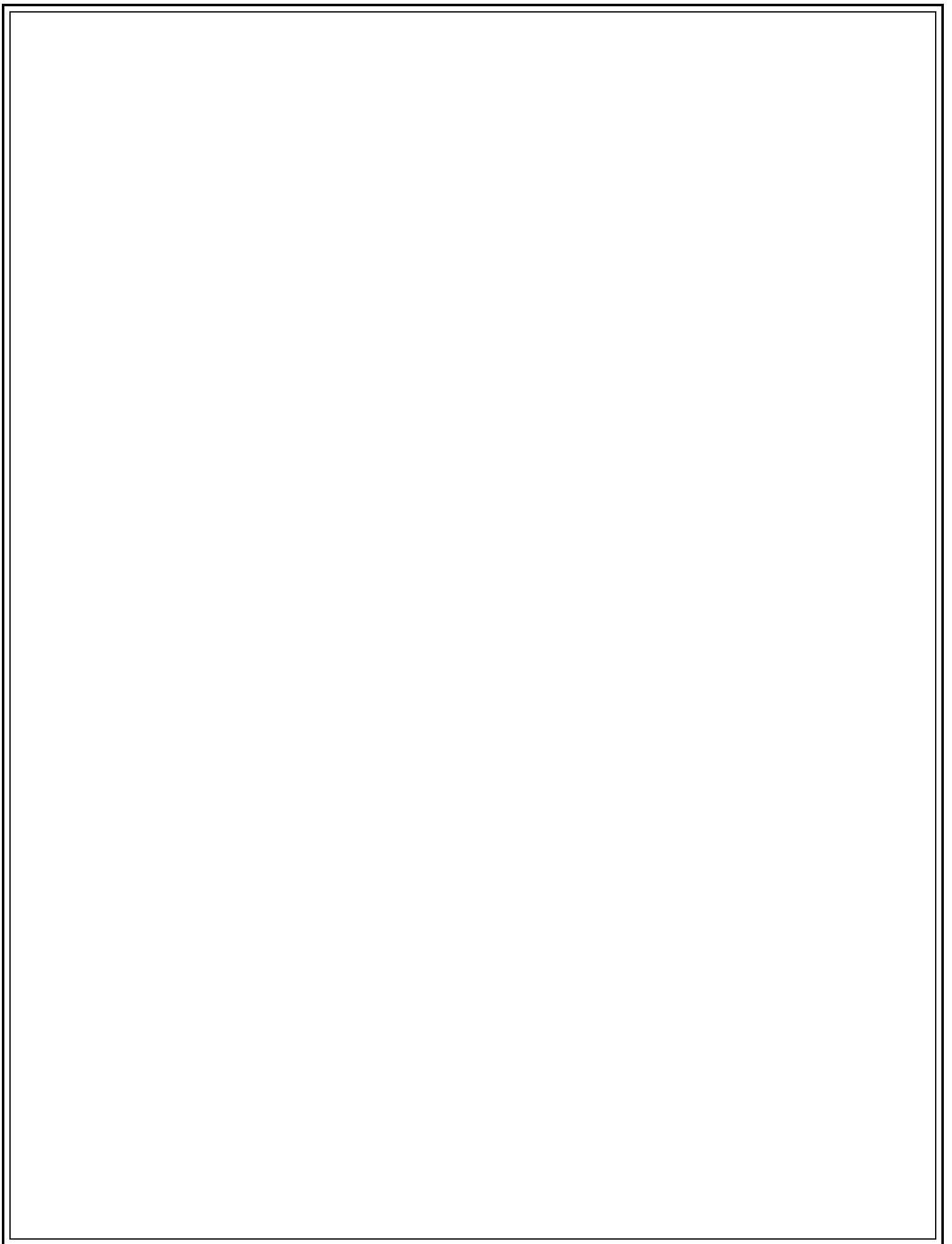

**Keynote Address: *Education is Prevention* - Robin Bleich |
Chair, International Association of Chiefs' of Police | Crime

This session introduces the *International Association of Chiefs of Police* (IACP) and its *Crime Prevention Committee* (CPC); emphasizing the importance of partnerships, while exploring current and prospective IACP CPC initiatives.

**Robin Bleich, Chair, International Association of Chiefs' of
Police Crime Prevention Committee**

Robin, 33, is a 12-year veteran police officer with the Niagara Regional Police Service (NRPS). She's a post-secondary graduate student in police sciences and business communications; she is continuing her education through Athabasca University, working toward completing her Four-Year Bachelor of Professional Arts degree, with a



major in Criminal Justice. In 2015, she accepted a two-year tenure nomination to sit on the International Association of Chiefs of Police's (IACP) Crime Prevention Committee — sitting among FBI Directors, Chiefs, Deputies, and Private Sector CEO's. Within 1.5 years, she has since extended her tenure and has been appointed Chair of the committee by the IACP President Dekmar— representing her organization as its lowest-ranking, youngest Canadian female, chairing an IACP committee. Robin has received numerous awards in community and industrial leadership, alumni accolades, OWLE; the most prestigious among them being IACP's 40 under 40; an international award recognizing 40 police officers globally. Robin has been dubbed an *Agent of Change*.

Robin pushes the barriers to bring public and private sectors together; dissolving silos, and developing a larger sense of collective efficacy. Her personal path serves as a precursor to advance her leadership in safety; to continue building transnational commitments to emergency intelligence globally.

Session A – Counterfeit Prevention and Detection; Oak Room A

The Bank of Canada is responsible for fighting counterfeit money by instilling confidence in the use of Canadian currency with the general public. This mandate is achieved with a number of approaches including Crime Prevention by using the education and awareness program developed specifically to stop the crime before the victimization.

Over the years the Bank has developed critical relationships with organizations in the Law Enforcement, Retail, Educational and Financial Institution sectors to achieve this goal. Representatives from the Bank will describe the history of the program along with techniques, initiatives, and partnerships developed to ensure the successful implementation of a Crime Prevention strategy in the fight against counterfeiting.

Manuel Parreira, Regional Director, Bank of Canada

Manuel Parreira was appointed Regional Director for the Bank of Canada's Ontario Regional Office in July 2007. In this capacity, he promotes the Bank across Ontario and delivers its products and services to key stakeholders.



His role includes building and maintaining relationships with financial and business communities, law enforcement and government agencies, educational institutions and the general public, who have a vested interest in currency.

Additional responsibilities include the Bank of Canada's Regional Office Outreach program, aimed at explaining the Bank's activities to the public, including a program to increase public awareness of the anti-counterfeiting features of Canadian bank notes.

In his 37 years of service, Mr. Parreira's experience has provided him with opportunities to work in various Bank departments with the main focus being on the currency function.

Session A – The Clear Zone Robbery Prevention Program; Oak Room A

This session will focus on how Peel Regional Police are using a proactive crime prevention approach to help convenience/gas-store retailers, pharmacies, and other businesses reduce incidents of crime while enhancing overall safety of the small business environment.

Cst. Amy Boudreau, Peel Regional Police-Crime Prevention

Cst. Amy Boudreau graduated from the University of Windsor with an Honours Bachelor's Degree in Sociology, and a minor in Criminology and Psychology, She holds a Professional Communications Certificate from the University of Toronto and is currently enrolled in a Leadership Certificate Program at the University of Waterloo. Cst. Boudreau has spent the last seven years as a police



officer with Peel Regional Police and is currently assigned to Crime Prevention Services.

Amy is certified in Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) Level 1 and regularly conducts Security Audits for residential, commercial, and public spaces. Amy has appeared as a guest lecturer for the Ontario Convenience Store Association (OSCA) & Western Convenience Store Association (WCSA) Convenience U CARWACS Conference held in 2017 & 2018, has contributed a cover article in the Convenience and Carwash Canada magazine, and has recently published an article in Blue Line, one of Canada's leading law enforcement magazines.

Session B – Community Mobilization and Engagement; Oak Room B

The Halton Regional Police Service is widely known as one of the most progressive community policing services in Canada. It is recognized for award winning programs reaching out to partner with over 500,000 people in the diverse communities it serves. Members of our Community Mobilization Bureau will highlight how the Halton Police have been able to enhance communication and relationships between its officers and the public.

Cst. Ryan Smith, Halton Regional Police

Cst. Ryan Smith began his career with the Halton Regional Police Service in 2009 when he joined as a Cadet. After three years in uniform patrol he transferred to the Drug, Gun and Gang Unit where he investigated various criminal offences related to high level drug trafficking and illegal firearms possession. During this time, he also served a one year secondment in the Human Trafficking and Vice Unit investigating offences related to the trafficking of person's associated to prostitution.

In 2016, Cst. Smith moved into the Regional Community Mobilization Bureau which oversees several Region wide community initiatives. Cst. Smith has participated in several volunteer and community opportunities both within the Halton Regional Police Service and with outside agencies. These initiatives include sitting on committees for Our Kids Network, a Burlington Anti Bullying Task Force and the Halton Heroes Committee which has raised over \$500,000 for Police officers families in the event of serious injury or death while on duty.

Plenary Session - *SNAP (Stop Now And Plan) - A Canadian-made Best Practice Built on More Than 32 Years of Evidence*

This presentation will focus on a leading evidence-based, gender-specific, self-regulation model, Stop Now And Plan® (SNAP), as an example of best practice for middle years children (aged 6-11) and their parents. SNAP was developed in Toronto by the Child Development Institute as a cognitive-behavioural Crime Prevention strategy that teaches high risk children (and their parents) to regulate their emotions and increase self-control by getting them to stop and think before they act so they can make better choices ‘in the moment’– helping to keep them in school and out of trouble. This has led to the creation of happier, healthier and safer children, families and communities on both the national and international stage, and, in the process, maximized the positive impact of a program which has had the benefit of over 32 years of research and development through a scientist-practitioner lens behind it and is currently being positioned for a major scale up through the SNAP National Expansion campaign.

Dr. Leena K. Augimeri is Director of SNAP® Scientific and Program Development at the Child Development Institute and Adjunct Professor at the University of Toronto. This scientist-practitioner’s work over 32 years has focused on development, research, dissemination and implementation of SNAP (Stop Now And Plan), an evidence-based gender specific model, and a comprehensive crime prevention framework for young children with serious disruptive behaviour problems. She has authored numerous publications, conducted hundreds of presentations and keynote addresses and received several prestigious awards, including the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health’s (CAMH) Difference Makers Award (150 leading Canadians for mental health), Prime Minister’s Regional Social Innovation Award, the Elizabeth Manson Award for exemplary contributions to the promotion of children’s mental health and the inaugural CWLC’s inaugural Outstanding Achievement Research and Evaluation Award. Dr. Augimeri is currently leading a SNAP National Expansion in Canada using a venture philanthropy framework bringing together government, business/corporate, foundations and philanthropic donors to create massive social change within children’s mental health by scaling SNAP to 140 new communities reaching approximately 20,000 children and their families.

Tom McKay, B. Comm., ISCPP President-Elect

Session B - CPTED for Bridge Structures; Oak Room B

The task of securing our nation's bridges against crime is often considered the responsibility of law enforcement and intelligence agencies, however, the bridge designer has a vital role in the security process. This session will examine how CPTED strategies can be applied to bridge structures. In addition, this session will provide the crime prevention professional with an overview of how bridges are designed and constructed and will discuss some of the challenges of implementing CPTED on a bridge.

Andrew Mah, P.Eng., FCP, is a professional engineer and former first responder with 10 years of engineering/project management experience in bridges and critical infrastructure facilities. As an engineer and project manager, Andrew has held positions in both

Andrew is a licensed member of the PEO and APEGA, a current serving board member with IABSE YEP, and holds additional memberships with ASIS, CPTED Ontario, and IABSE.</p>

Participants will be provided with an overview of the underlying philosophy and learn about the Continuum of Restorative Practices. Participants will learn how Restorative Practices can be used to support and implement Ontario's Mobilization and Engagement Model of Community Policing. The session will review how restorative approaches can be utilized in school settings and be used to assist with the resolution of Customer Service Resolutions and Public Complaints against Police Officers.</p> <p>Mike Shard, LLB., B.A.</p> <p>Mike Shard worked as a police officer for the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) for 32 years, retiring in 2016 as Chief Superintendent, and is also a lawyer. He holds a diploma in Aviation and Flight Technology from Seneca College, a BA in Commerce from the University of Toronto, an MBA from York University, a law degree (LLB) and a masters in law (LLM) specializing in Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) from Osgoode Hall. He spent 15+ years in the OPP Professional Standards Bureau, which manages public and internal complaints under the Police Services Act, including time as Prosecutor, Manager of Investigations and Bureau Commander. Mike has presented on numerous PSA related courses at both the OPP and Ontario Police College. He is passionate about dispute resolution, was trained by the RCMP on Restorative Justice (RJ) as facilitator and trainer, and has delivered ADR and RJ related training on many OPP courses and to numerous school boards.</p> <p>Rajender Sud, B. Sc.</p> <p>Rajender Sud, recently retired from the Ontario Provincial Police after 25 years. He graduated from the University of Toronto with a B.Sc. Prior to joining the Ontario Provincial Police, Raj worked in the Private Sector in the area of Human Rights, Equity and Diversity. For the last 25 years he has assisted with and coordinated the</p>

implementation of Restorative Practices, Ontario's Mobilization and Engagement Model for Community Policing, Crime Prevention and assisted with the implementation of the Mental Health Strategy. Raj has worked closely in helping and supporting police and community groups across Ontario build relationships. He has facilitated Restorative Circles in schools, police agencies and not for profit organizations and assisted many organizations implement Restorative Practices.

Over the past 15 years Raj has helped implement Restorative practices in School Boards and communities across Ontario. He has facilitated circles for entire classrooms and grades to deal with behavioural issues. He has helped resolve internal and public complaints against police officers as well as resolving workplace conflicts for both small groups and the entire department. He's experienced in facilitating circles to build relationships between organizations and First Nations communities and has successfully mediated conflicts between 2 individuals and conducted circles with almost 100 participants. He has a training background and has delivered ADR and Restorative Justice related facilitator training courses as well as many train the trainer course to police officers and community members.

Plenary Session - *Safe City Mississauga: The Safest City Report*

Safe City Mississauga is a registered charitable organization founded in 1992 to help reduce criminal opportunity and criminal victimization in Mississauga. The organization provides resources, staff, professional community leadership and guidance for crime prevention programs and activities; encourages crime prevention education within the public, private and voluntary sectors; and researches, develops and implements new community crime prevention programs and activities.

Each year, Safe City Mississauga is responsible for the annual release of the Safest City Report. This study calculates the crime rates, counts, and severity in the City of Mississauga and the Toronto Census Metropolitan area, longitudinal from 2008. The presentation will share how crime trends have changed within Mississauga and will inform audiences of the volume and severity of criminality over time. In addition, the presentation will provide information regarding Safe City Mississauga's crime prevention programs and initiatives, three of which have been awarded the ISCPP Community-Based Program of the Year.

Executive Director Safe City Mississauga**

Nadia Mokriy is the Executive Director of Safe City Mississauga. Nadia has been a part of Safe City Mississauga since 2013, starting as a volunteer and through successive
